Roadway Travels

"Roadway Travels" is in business since 1997 with several buses connecting different places in India. Its main office is located in Hyderabad. The company wants to computerize its operations in the following areas:

Reservation & Cancellation

Reservations are directly handled by booking office, Reservations can be made 30 days in advance and tickets issued to passenger. One Passenger/person can book many tickets (to his/her family). Cancellations are also directly handled at the booking office.

In the process of computerization of Roadway Travels you have to design and develop a Database which consists the data of Buses, Passengers, Tickets, and Reservation and cancellation details. You should also develop queries using SQL to retrieve the data from the database.

The above process involves many steps like

- 1 Analyzing the problem and identifying the Entities and Relationships,
- 2 E-R Model
- 3 Relational Model
- 4 Normalization
- 5 Creating the database
- 6 Querying Students are supposed to work on these steps week wise and finally create a complete “Database System” to Roadway Travels.

Examples are given at every experiment for guidance to students.

Experiment 1:

E-R Model

Analyze the problem carefully and come up with the entities in it. Identify what data has to be persisted in the database. This contains the entities, attributes etc.

Identify the primary keys for all the entities. Identify the other keys like candidate keys, partial keys, if any. Example:

Entities: 1. Bus 2. Ticket 3. Passenger Relationships

1. Reservation. 2. Cancellation. Primary Key

Attributes: 1. TicketID (Ticket Entity)

2. PassportID (Passenger Entity)

3. Bus_No. (Bus Entity)

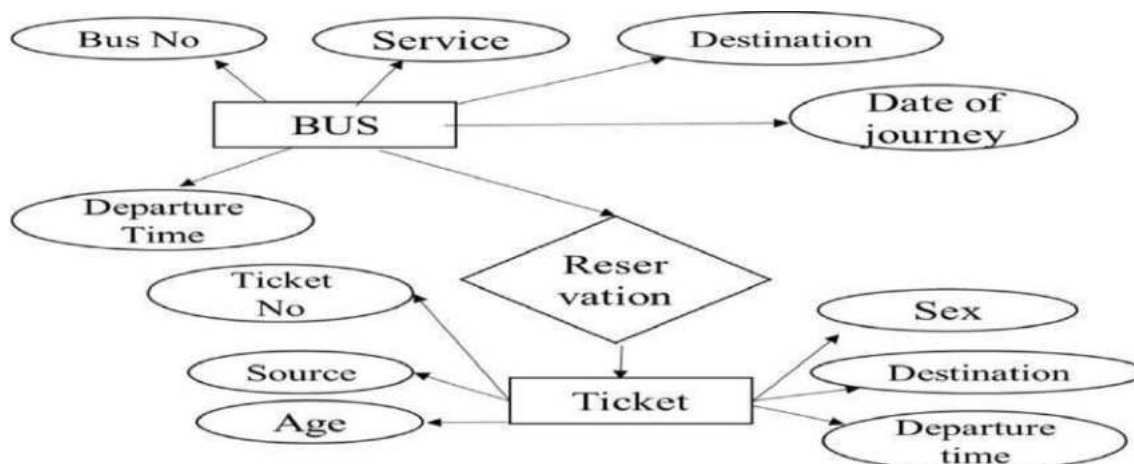
Apart from the above mentioned entities you can identify more. The above mentioned are few.

Experiment 2:

Concept design with E-R Model

Relate the entities appropriately. Apply cardinalities for each relationship. Identify strong entities and weak entities (if any). Indicate the type of relationships (total/partial). Try to incorporate generalization, aggregation, specialization etc wherever required.

Example: E-R diagram for bus



Experiment 3:

Relational Model

Represent all the entities (Strong, Weak) in tabular fashion. Represent relationships in a tabular fashion. There are different ways of representing relationships as tables based on the cardinality. Represent attributes as columns in tables or as tables based on the requirement. Different types of attributes (Composite, Multi-valued, and Derived) have different way of representation.

Experiment 4:**Installation of Mysql and practicing DDL commands**

Experiment 9:**Normalization**

Database normalization is a technique for designing relational database tables to minimize duplication of information and, in so doing, to safe guard the database against certain types of logical or structural problems, namely data anomalies. For example, when multiple instances of a given piece of information occur in a table, the possibility exists that these instances will not be kept consistent when the data within the table is updated, leading to a loss of data integrity. A table that is sufficiently normalized is less vulnerable to problems of this kind, because its structure reflects the basic assumptions for when multiple instances of the same information should be represented by a single instance only. For the above table in the First normalization we can remove the multi valued attribute Ticket id and place it in another table along with the primary key of passenger.

First Normal Form: The above table can be divided into two tables as shown below.

You can do the second and third normal forms if required. Any, how Normalized tables are given at the end.

OBJECT ORIENTED PROGRAMMING THROUGH JAVA LAB (D54PC10)

Course Objective

To provide students with a deep understanding of implementation of object oriented concepts using java programming in real time applications.

Course Outcomes

Upon completion of this course the students will be able to :

1. Apply file system operations, sorting techniques and data structures for efficient data Management and retrieval and to develop Java programs that utilize multithreading for concurrent execution. L3
2. Develop interactive applications with event-driven programming. L3
3. Apply inheritance concepts to create subclasses (Rectangle, Triangle, Circle) that extend the abstract class Shape. L3

List of Experiments to be performed during the Course

1. Use Eclipse or Net beans platform and acquaint with the various menus. Create a test project, add a test class, and run it. See how you can use auto suggestions, auto fill. Try code formatter and code refactoring like renaming variables, methods, and classes. Try debug step by step with a small program of about 10 to 15 lines which contains at least one if else condition and a for loop.

2. Write a Java program to create an abstract class named Shape that contains two integers and an empty method named print Area(). Provide three classes named Rectangle, Triangle, and Circle such that each one of the classes extends the class Shape. Each one of the classes contains only the method print Area() that prints the area of the given shape.

3. Write a Java program that implements a multi-thread application that has three threads. First thread generates random integer every 1 second and if the value is even, second thread computes the square of the number and prints. If the value is odd, the third thread will print the value of cube of the number.

4. Write a Java program that correctly implements the producer–consumer problem using the concept of inter thread communication.

5. Write a Java program for the following:

- a. Create a doubly linked list of elements.
- b. Delete a given element from the above list.
- c. Display the contents of the list after deletion.

6. Write a Java program that loads names and phone numbers from a text file where the data is organized as one line per record and each field in a record are separated by a tab(\t). It takes a name or phone number as input and prints the corresponding other value from the hash table (hint: use hash tables).
7. Write a Java program to list all the files in a directory including the files present in all its Subdirectories.
8. Write a Java program that implements Bubble sort algorithm for sorting in descending order and also show the number of interchanges occurred for the given set of integers.
9. Write a Java program that implements Quick sort algorithm for sorting a list of names in ascending order.
10. Write a Java program that simulates a traffic light. The program lets the user select one of three lights: red, yellow, or green with radio buttons. On selecting a button, an appropriate message with "Stop" or "Ready" or "Go" should appear above the buttons in selected color. Initially, there is no message shown.
11. Write a Java program that creates a user interface to perform integer divisions. The user enters two numbers in the text fields, Num1 and Num2. The division of Num1 and Num2 is displayed in the Result field when the Divide button is clicked. If Num1 or Num2 were not an integer, the program would throw a Number Format Exception. If Num2 were Zero, the program would throw an Arithmetic Exception. Display the exception in a message dialog box.
12. Write a Java program that handles all mouse events and shows the event name at the center of the window when a mouse event is fired (Use Adapter classes).
13. Write a Java program that works as a simple calculator. Use a grid layout to arrange buttons for the digits and for the +, -, *, % operations. Add a text field to display the result. Handle any possible exceptions like divided by zero.
14. Suppose that a table named Table.txt is stored in a text file. The first line in the file is the header, and the remaining lines correspond to rows in the table. The elements are separated by commas. Write a java program to display the table using Labels in Grid Layout.

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WEB TECHNOLOGIES LAB (D54PC11)

Course Objective:

To enable students to develop web applications using the following technologies HTML, Javascript, AJAX, PHP, Tomcat Server, Servlets, JSP.

Course Outcomes:

Upon completion of this course the students will be able to :

1. Determine the fundamental concepts and syntax of HTML, JavaScript, and XML to build basic web applications. L3
2. Develop web applications that handle user input and provide appropriate responses of client-server interaction and data manipulation. L3
3. Apply the concept of programming constructs and (PHP, JavaServlets, JSP, AJAX) to develop interactive web applications, demonstrate and practical utilization and to develop XML documents validating them against a Document Type Definition (DTD), and representing them using DOM and SAX parsers. L3

List of Experiments:

1. A simple calculator web application that takes two numbers and an operator (+, -, /, * and %) from an HTML page and returns the result page with the operation performed on the operands.
2. Modify the above program such that it stores each query in a database and checks the database first for the result. If the query is already available in the DB, it returns the value that was previously computed (from DB) or it computes the result and returns it after storing the new query and result in DB.
3. A web application takes a name as input and on submit it shows a hello page where is taken from the request. It shows the start time at the right top corner of the page and provides a logout button. On clicking this button, it should show a logout page with Thank You message with the duration of usage (hint: Use session to store name and time).
4. A web application that takes name and age from an HTML page. If the age is less than it should send a page with "Hello, you are not authorized to visit this site" message, where should be replaced with the entered name. Otherwise it should send "Welcome to this site" message.
5. A web application for implementation: The user is first served a login page which takes users name and password. After submitting the details, the server checks these values against the data from a database and takes the following decisions. If name and password matches, serves a welcome page with users full name. If name matches and password does not match, then serves "password mismatch" page If name is not found in the database, serves a registration page,

where user's full name is asked and on submitting the full name, it stores, the login name, password and full name in the database (hint: use session for storing the submitted login name and password)

6. A web application that lists all cookies stored in the browser on clicking "List Cookies" button. Add cookies if necessary.

7. A user validation web application, where the user submits the login name and password to the server. The name and password are checked against the data already available in Database and if the data matches, a successful login page is returned. Otherwise a failure message is shown to the user.

8. Modify the 7th program to use an **XML** file instead of database.

9. Create an XML document that contains 10 users information. Write a Java program, which takes User Id as input and returns the user details by taking the user information from the XML document using

- a DOM Parser and
- b SAX parser

10. Create an XML document that contains 10 users information. Write a Java program, which takes User Id as input and returns the user details by taking the user information from the XML document to implement the following web applications using

- a Servlets and
- b JSP

10. Write an HTML page including JavaScript that takes a given set of integer numbers and shows them after sorting in descending order.

11. Write an HTML page including any required JavaScript that takes a number from one text field in the range of 0 to 999 and shows it in another text field in words. If the number is out of range, it should show "out of range" and if it is not a number, it should show "not a number" message in the result box.

12. Write an HTML page that has one input, which can take multi-line text and a submit button. Once the user clicks the submit button, it should show the number of characters, words and lines in the text entered using an alert message. Words are separated with white space and lines are separated with new line character.

13. Write an HTML page that contains a selection box with a list of 5 countries. When the user selects a country, its capital should be printed next to the list. Add CSS to customize the properties of the font of the capital (color, bold and font size).

14. A user validation web application, where the user submits the login name and password to the server. The name and password are checked against the data already available in Database and if the data matches, a successful login page is returned. Otherwise a failure message is shown to the user by using AJAX to show the result on the same page below the submit button.
